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President's Report

Donald Wright, President

First, a huge shout out to the executive. They do the real work of keeping the Club on track and moving forward.

Because I don t want to tell you what they are going to tell you, I will keep my comments brief.

In early January, we developed a series of Communicable Disease Prevention Plans to comply with Public Health Guidelines. But a prevention plan is only as good as you, the members. A million thanks for your co-operation.

We continue to work with the City of Fredericton to improve the trail system and to improve the grooming at Killarney Lake. Good news: the City will be creating new signage throughout the park. Some trails will be designated walking; some trails will be designated skiing; and some trails will be designated mixed-use.

Cross-Country Ski New Brunswick was thrilled when, on short notice and under very iffy conditions, we hosted the first in-person NB Cup in two years. I am in awe of the volunteer team that made that possible!

Wostawea celebrated its fifth anniversary with the Multicultural Association of Fredericton, offering 4 weeks of ski lessons to new Canadians from across the world. Of all my connections to Wostawea, from longtime Bunny coach to Sven the Head Waxer, teaching new Canadians how to ski and introducing them to winter may be my fav.

At its last meeting, the executive developed No Skier Left Behind, an initiative that will ensure that any child that wants to ski can ski. We will waive lesson fees, we will support the lease package through Radical Edge, and we will set aside money in our spring budget meeting to help an older child purchase ski equipment, when and if necessary. We do not know what the up take will be, but we are committed to making skiing available to all families.

Finally, Wostawea launched a new outreach program this year when a small group of volunteers worked with Under One Sky Friendship Centre, an Indigenous organization, to host a fun ski day.

Competitive Programs

Ski Team

The Wostawea Ski Team (formerly Racing Team) runs a year-long competitive racing team program that includes dryland training, team outings, training camps, on snow training and involvement in the NB Province Race Circuit, and regional and National level competitions.

Once again, we had significant challenges in the 2021-2022 season as the Wostawea ski team coped with the COVID pandemic. We also had considerable growth in our coach and management group, requiring greater structure to meet the needs of our growing team. The team has been divided into Junior (10-12), Intermediate (13-14) and Senior (14-18) athletes. Coaches were assigned to each group. The Masters component of the previous ski team separated to become their own group, with separate schedule, activities and coaches.

The New Brunswick Provincial team re-initiated summer/fall training camps after a year hiatus due to pandemic restrictions. Wostawea athletes on the provincial team were involved in camps starting in June at Caraquet. In addition, Wostawea was invited to join Club Orford (team from Sherbrooke) in Charlevoix for a 3 day training camp in July. This was our first ever interprovincial training camp, and we learned a lot from their coaches and athletes. Wostawea hosted the provincial camp in September at Fundy National Park. Our full team training program started first week in October. We continued our fall strength training program at the Canadian Sport Centre (Atlantic) at UNB. Other events included Crabbe Mountain trail run, Orienteering at Mactaquac and end of dryland training at the Jones/Healy Hill training/hot chocolate event.

On snow season started in December with a provincial training camp in Charlo. Our regular on-snow season started in early January with four training sessions per week. The first four NB Cup events were virtual", however, 5 in person races were conducted in the second half of February and beginning of March. Wostawea athletes attended out of province events at Joliette for the Noram Midget Championships, Eastern Championships in Gatineau Quebec and the Nationals in Whistler. For each of these provincial team events, Wostawea provided the head coach.

The ski team again received significant donations this year from Remsoft, Radical Edge, Radiance and IJB Consultants. We hope to continue in our path forward to support our growing team. Initiatives for 2022 include working toward getting a paid coach for the team and club, and prepping for the Canada winter games which will be held in PEI in February 2023.

Masters Group

Masters skiers have been part of the Wostawea Ski Team (formerly Racing Team) since it began ten years ago, but numbers remained low (3-4 per year) even as the youth numbers grew. This year, the club decided to form a separate group for Masters only, with a goal to ski and train together and motivate each other to enter races and loppets. We hoped for 10-15 members and ended up with 30. After a couple of Sunday afternoon hikes in the Fall, we began a regular schedule of three sessions a week once the snow arrived in January, with technique sessions on Wednesday afternoons and group skis on Thursday evenings and Sunday afternoon, alternating between Killarney and Kingswood.

COVID restrictions and weather problems substantially reduced our expected number of meetings, but the group's first season was a success overall and enjoyed by those who attended. Numbers for particular sessions varied from low single digits to 15 or so. Several members competed in virtual or inperson NB Cup races and/or loppets, and three members did biathlons and/or the virtual Canadian Ski Marathon. We look forward to building on the foundation of learning, socializing, and pushing each other on skis next season! Since thanks to Nathalie Comeau and Fran Robinson for leading technique sessions and to the two of them plus Etienne Dupuis, Jane Hadley, Nadya Ladouceur, and Don Wright for stepping up as group leaders.

Racing Events

MARITIME CUP

This year we faced the double challenge of low snow conditions and COVID restrictions. We delayed the event by one week in the hope of more snow, but we still had to go virtual because of COVID and spread the event over 3 days because of weather! About 140 skiers participated.

NB CUP #1

This was the first real live race for two years and the racers, volunteers and supporters embraced the occasion. Although we still had some COVID restrictions in place, it was good to see lots of smiling faces!

We did have to change courses a couple of days before the event due to rain/icy conditions, but we were able to pull off a successful event working with the city who did a good job in grooming.

The event was deemed to be a great success although only 62 racers participated. There were some differences in how we arranged some things compared to previous years and a lessons learned has been prepared to document the arrangements.

Ski Lessons

Youth Programs

OVERVIEW

The 2022 youth program was again a huge success. This year, the registration was capped to 200 participants and filled up within hours.

In keeping with the lessons learned the previous year, this year's format included two time slots for the program lessons, with each having approximately 100 participants. Bunny Rabbits, Level 1 and Level 2 lessons were given on Saturday morning from 9:30am to 11:00am, where Level 3, 4 and Track Attack lessons were from 11:30am to 1:30pm. All lessons were offered at Killarney Lake Park.

Unfortunately, the COVID lock down instated by public health immediately after the Christmas holidays prevented us from starting our program as planned on January 8. The first lesson had to be delayed by two weeks to January 22. Furthermore, a warm weather spell deteriorated the snow conditions to a point that the February 12 lesson had to be cancelled. We attempted to make up for the lost lessons by extending the program to March 19, but again marginal snow conditions and iced trails forced the cancellation of the March 12 and March 19 lessons. In all, we were able to successfully offer six of the eight planned lessons.

New this year was also the introduction of a fall dryland program for Level 4 and Track Attack.

INSTRUCTORS

In all, we had 30 instructors, of which a few were new this year. We anticipate needing approximately the same number of instructors next season. Recruitment and formation of new instructors should continue.

A Community Coaching Course was held in November. We also intended to host a second course in January, however, due to the COVID lock down after the holidays, the January course did not take place.

FALL DRYLAND TRAINING

The fall dryland training was held every Tuesday evening and Saturday morning from September 18 to November 20. Participation exceeded expectations with 24 registered and a solid participation of 15 to 18 youth per lesson. Based on this year's success, we will offer the dryland training next season and possibly extend its offering to athletes of Level 3 as well.

With the addition of the fall dryland training, our Youth Program is now much better aligned with the recommended number of off-snow and on-snow lessons put forward by Nordiq Canada.

SKI TERRAIN PARK

The ski terrain park was mostly constructed and ready for this winter. Construction was halted in late November as the weather was turning to winter. The City of Fredericton parks and engineering division will return this summer to complete the ski terrain grading, topsoil and seeding. Some minor improvements and adjustment will be made based on this year's experience.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR NEXT SEASON

- **Registration:** Registration for 2023 would have to be in two folds. The Dryland Training registration should open in August (Level 4 and TA) and the general Youth Program registration should open in early November.
- **Training:** A Community Coaching Course should be offered in Fredericton next fall/winter for our new instructors and for the previously trained group to complete their on-snow curriculum. It would also be recommended to offer a Learn to Train course next season.
- **Program Equipment Roller Skis:** With the successful deployment of dryland training, it would be nice to add six (6) pairs of roller skis to our inventory of 18 pairs.

In closing, we have to acknowledge the dedicated help of many volunteers, coaches and parents that contributed in many ways in this successful season.

Adult Programs

Adult Lessons

Wostawea's popular adult lessons took place once again at Killarney Lake Park and registration reached new heights with 66 skiers taking part.

While Mother Nature and COVID posed a few challenges to scheduling, we were pleased that lessons were held on six of the eight Saturdays. We're even more pleased with the progress made by all skiers and the energy they brought to trails.

We had an amazing crew of 20 coaches who shared their coaching talents and snowy covered enthusiasm with their groups. Thank you to these volunteers!

We are looking forward to next year's lessons, and hope that Mother Nature delivers a real 'Wostawea' winter!

Skate Ski Technique Clinics

Again this year, Wostawea offered early-season skate ski technique clinics for beginner or intermediate adult skiers. Registrations set a new record as 35 Wostawea members took part in the clinics to learn the fundamentals of skate skiing or to raise their skills to the next level. The four-hour program ran on two Saturday afternoons, with an unexpected hiatus between the first and second sessions due to pandemic restrictions, but this just gave everyone more time to practice in between! Feedback from participants was very positive, which is a credit to the wonderful volunteer coaches who stepped up to introduce the pleasures of skate skiing to these eager Wostaweans: Pierre Boucher, Emilie Comeau, Nathalie Comeau, Jane Hadley, Eamonn Lynch, Fran Robinson. Given the popularity of these clinics over the past four or five years, we plan to offer them again next January.

Outreach Programs

Learn to Ski for Newcomers to Canada

In 2022, we celebrated our fifth year of this program with our partners at the Multicultural Association of Fredericton, and what a season we had! Over 20 volunteers from our club greeted 45 skiers from ten countries and introduced them to skiing and basic skills. Despite a shortened program due to weather and the ongoing COVID pandemic, there was great enthusiasm, comradery, and smiles shared by skiers and volunteers alike on the snow and out in the trails. To our delight, three of our young new skiers signed up to participate in the NB Cup Race in March and all three finished on the podium for their age group – awesome! According to Shahram Ghanbari who is our key contact at MCAF, this program is a highlight of their winter season. To date, we ve shared our passion for cross-country skiing and winter with over 200 newcomers to Canada. After learning basic skills, we encourage skiers to join our regular programs, and we are beginning to see this unfold, which is a good sign. Good ski gear is essential and this year we added to our inventory so that each skier had excellent equipment to use that fit them well. Our last date was rained out, so we missed the opportunity to cap off the program in person and invite participants to join our programs next year. This fall, I would like to develop a recruitment plan" to integrate newcomers into regular programming, in discussion with club executive and Shahram, and in advance of the registration date for youth and adult lessons. Coordinators: Mary Murdoch and Kristie Heard. Head Coach: Toon Pronk.

Indigenous Outreach

We launched our first learn-to-ski program with Indigenous neighbours in 2022 and partnered with Under One Sky Friendship Centre, which is a local non-profit group that offers services and programs for off-reserve Indigenous people. Kids, teachers, and a grandmother came out for an afternoon of fun

on skis in the ski cross park area, learning how to navigate gentle hills and turns. Nine volunteers from the club pitched in to plan and deliver this inaugural program. We hope to grow this program next season with more dates and more participants. Dave Kersey – we thank you for the spark that lit this fire. We also thank Moon Joyce, who was instrumental in setting up our connection with Under One Sky. A big thank you to Cross-Country New Brunswick for funding this first learn-to-ski program.

Hot Chocolate

The hot chocolate booth was a busy après ski" gathering place again this year for our skiers after completing their Saturday lessons. This program serves youth and adult lessons, ski team, MCAF, and Indigenous outreach, and is available for other programs if requested. For the second season, the booth was stationed outside near the lodge and also went mobile, pulled by the pulk out on the trails to deliver a sweet surprise at Spaghetti Junction and Lone Pine Café. Club thermoses (all 14) also hit the trails with coaches each week as well – there is no doubt that our skiers are chocoholics! With encouragement from Liz Smith, we were able to reduce our waste this year by serving unpackaged snacks and by encouraging skiers to bring their own mugs and ring the rusty cow bell as a reward. A big thank you to our generous sponsor DWC Law! As for our volunteers - we were blessed with four keen new volunteers who set up and served, no matter how crazy the weather was. Two volunteers in particular showed up for each lesson day without fail: Anika Smithson and Shauna Martin. Next fall, Mary would like to review this program and develop a plan for 2023 for oversight, logistics, and volunteer recruitment.

Recreational Programs

Senior Ski Tours

We had an abbreviated season, with a late start and several Thursdays with adverse weather conditions. Nevertheless, people enjoyed getting together Thursday afternoons to enjoy winter in good company.

The senior ski tour is a relaxed, guided, recreational ski, typically 5-10 km. A great opportunity for adult skiers to explore our winter parks safely, enjoy the company of friends and learn from one another.

Sunday Ski Tours

Thank you to Ron and Liz Smith for hosting the McLeod Hill Sunday Ski Tour on January 9. Eight people attended (a few new, young folks and a few veterans). Conditions were perfect! Unfortunately, the other planned tours had to be cancelled this year. Next year, we may have another tour in our series. The Nashwaak Watershed Association has offered to host a tour on the Nashwaak or Saint John River.

Loppet

Because of pandemic restrictions, we hosted a virtual loppet over three days, February 11-13.

The organizing committee included Ian Burgess, Michel Poirier, Barb Ramsay, and Donald Wright, with help from Cross-Country Ski New Brunswick.

A total of 85 skiers skied a range of distances, from 2.5kms to 42kms.

As we did last year, we donated all of the proceeds (\$900+) to the Fredericton Homeless Shelters.

Congratulations to the Jones-Healey Family, winner of the 2022 Morimanno Cup, awarded to the family that skis the most kilometers.

Para Skiing

This winter, Wostawea collaborated with CCNB to find individuals who could go out skiing with a female para skier. A group of volunteers came together, a meet and greet with the para skier took place at Killarney, and emails were exchanged for future outings. CCNB provided a sit ski for the club to

use. It currently resides at Milda s as the club does not have sufficient storage space at Killarney. Claudette Kavanaugh at CCNB is looking into organizing a session with Claudette Maltais or Terry Lavoie to get some tips on how to best support para skiers (going uphill, how to safely go downhill, etc.). Wostawea also worked with the city to have designated parking spaces for persons with mobility impairments at the entrance of the trails. Thank you to the city for acting swiftly and installing a new accessible parking sign close to the ski entrance.

Vulnerable Sector Checks & Coaching Certification Database

The safety of participants, coaches and volunteers in all the Wostawea programs is of paramount importance. Wostawea has, as part of this is process, put in place the practice of having all coaches and volunteers undergo vulnerable persons checks (VPC). We are pleased to let the membership know that over 50 new security clearance checks were done this past season. Your executive maintains a record system such that the security checks are current and that as new volunteers and coaches join the ranks, they likewise have a current VPC.

We also strive to ensure that coaches have the training they need to deliver quality programs. This is an ongoing process, and we thank the many coaches who have recently taken training and for those who continue to advance their coaches skills through continuing education and advanced certification training.

Trails

KINGSWOOD/UNB WOODLOT TRAILS

This past season was short due to weather and lack of good snow. The two snowmobiles allowed us to groom the trails effectively when there was snow.

Once again, as soon as there was sufficient snow, our groomers did an admirable job of keeping the trails in good shape. New groomers were trained this past season. Again, the work done in the fall really helped in getting good results for the grooming.

The Lian Street entrance was used quite a bit this year. The trail had been upgraded courtesy of JDI in the fall, and it made quite a difference when the snow was sufficient.

We made improvements to Stonehenge in the fall and this enabled us to groom more consistently in low snow conditions.

We will plan on further improvements to the Connector in the fall. We need to plan for better access for the grooming equipment as the golf course and the Highway trail were the limiting factors in getting the trails groomed this season.

It does seem that skiers' expectations regarding reporting conditions get more demanding each year so we will be investigating the use of the Nordic Pulse app for next season, especially if it can also be used at Killarney.

We are also in the early stages of looking at grooming equipment for when the older snowmobile reaches its useful grooming life, which could be after next season.

KILLARNEY LAKE PARK TRAILS

Grooming was again a challenge this year because of the low snow conditions. This reality, combined with rough spots on some of the trails, prevented the PistenBully from being used until later in January and it cut short the season. When unable to groom with the PistenBully, other equipment was deployed as conditions allowed, including the side by side with ginzu attachment, and the roller earlier in season.

Some key grooming dates at Killarney this season:

January 7 — started rolling and prepping the trails

January 9 — Ginzu used

January 19 — 108" Ginzu available (wider than original)

March 11 — last day of grooming

The PistenBully was unable to get to the park for the last day of grooming because there was construction on the access trail from Two Nations Crossing. Two new groomers were trained. Overall, the city groomers did a good job.

We have expressed our concern to the city and stated that in our opinion, the PistenBully should be stored at the park during the winter season. This is not an easy fix as a suitable building would need to be constructed. The back up to the PistenBully, the side by side/ginzu, is stored in Odell Park and can be quickly transported to Killarney via trailer. The new 108" ginzu attachment stays at Killarney. The city has stated that, at this time, the best storage for the PistenBully is at their shop on Two Nations Crossing, and with park access from Two Nations Crossing in the future, this remains the optimal storage location.

Access has and will be maintained through the 12 Neighbours development in agreement with the city. Some park users have commented that the nice trail from Two Nations Crossing to the park encourages the rogue four wheelers to get to the park more easily, creating a safety hazard in the park which is designated a non- motorized vehicle area. These rogue four wheelers bypass the park gate.

Walkers on the trails is an ongoing conflict between user types, but this year signage will be added to indicate walking/multi-use and ski trails. Education of park users is expected to improve trail conditions. This will not be exclusive, as it is a public park. This past season saw minimal complaints/issues between the user groups partly because of the increased weekend grooming. The city increased overtime allowing 7 day a week grooming when conditions permit.

Wostawea continues to work with the city to enable events to take place. For example, despite a significant rain event two days prior to the NB Cup #1, Wostawea was able to host this in-person event with over 60 competitors!

Communication was improved this year, and the city implemented a trial using an app (evtrails) which we provided some feedback on. This app was originally developed for snowmobile trails and does not have skier specific interests. The intent of the app is to simply update the status of the grooming indicating whether trails are groomed or otherwise. At this point, the city is not reporting conditions, just the time of last grooming. Other apps can be considered in the future on a pilot basis.

The ski terrain park was constructed last fall and it was a resounding success with both young and old. Some further work will be done this year (e.g., final grading, stabilization with vegetation), and other improvements are also planned (e.g., signage, planting some trees). During the latter part of the past short season the exposed location of the trail, as well as the "old stadium" area in general, became very icy, were difficult to groom, and were unsafe to ski.

The trail connecting the top of #6 to the top of #7 was cut last year, and this year it is expected this trail will be grubbed, such that it can be groomed next winter.

As trails are constructed, the city's intent is to surface them for year-round use and vehicle access, as well as maintenance requirements, all improving the ability to deploy the PistenBully earlier in low snow conditions.

We have applied to Nordiq Canada for homologation of trails. Homologation is the standardization of trails to an international standard which would allow us to host a national event. It is hoped that the small changes to the trails required to achieve homologation standard will be done later this year. Other trail improvements such as drainage are planned by the city.

TRAIL BUILDERS CONTRIBUTION COMPLETED

When the club undertook its Trails For Life fundraising campaign in 2018, six local businesses made an early commitment to donate a total of \$58,000 over a five year period with funds earmarked for the purchase of the PistenBully. Their five year commitment is ending this spring and we'd like to acknowledge the significant contribution their donations have made to the quality of trail grooming and skiing at Killarney.

SUMMARY


Wostawea communications are a club priority that provides members with relevant and timely information they need to maximize their season on the ski trails. Communications also serve to engage non-members who ski, partners, and the public in Wostawea's welcoming community. This report highlights the digital, social, and traditional communications activities undertaken this season.

2021-2022 COMMUNICATION ACTIVITIES: DIGITAL, SOCIAL & EARNED MEDIA

Four main communications tools were used to inform and engage with skiers, volunteers, partners and the community.

1. Digital Communication - Weekly Member Newsletters, October 2021 to April 2022

- 34 newsletters were sent to 1256 member units (i.e., households), spanning the six months from October 13, 2021 to April 6, 2022. It's expected that 2-3 additional newsletters will be sent before the end of April. All newsletters were posted to Facebook and Twitter to extend reach.
- When reviewing newsletter metrics over a six-month period (see graph below), this season's average open rate of 61% is well above related industry open rates of 25%, and 3% higher than last season's open rate of 58%. The average click rate of 6% seen this season is twice that of related industry averages of 3%.

4. Email Communication

Throughout the season hundreds of inquiries are made through the club's Gmail account. Inquiries are especially heavy during our registration period and starting dates of lesson programs. Efforts are made to reply to inquiries as quickly as possible although when email traffic is especially high, response times may take longer than expected.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR 2022-2023 COMMUNICATIONS

A number of recommendations are offered that would enhance communications moving forward.

4. Gmail Responsiveness

• To improve responsiveness, engage a volunteer to coordinate email inquiries.

WOSTAWEA ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE




- Strong membership numbers: We had at 1042 members this year; a bit down from last year's record of 1158 members. This is very good considering the ski conditions we had this season.
- 42% of membership are in the 50+ year category.
- Record demand for the Jackrabbit program; the increase in available space allowed us to have a record number in this program 203 versus lasts years limit of 161 participants.
- Record turnout in the adult classic lessons, with 66 adults signing up.
- A much lower turnout for the Virtual Loppet Record this year; 85 versus last year's 186 registrants. Again, snow conditions were a factor (as well all know so well).
- No Maritime Cup or Sprint events were held this year due to the pandemic.
- We did hold an NB Cup event with 57 participants.














Finances

SUMMARY

- Surplus of revenue over expenditure of \$17,427. This is mainly due to the large increase in youth program registration, government grant for Track Attack program and reduced fees for Killarney Lake Lodge.
- The extra spaces made available for Youth Lesson has increased the club's revenue significantly. The Youth and Adult Lesson are a great income source to the club thanks to the generous donation of the coaches' time and skill.
- Trails expenses were higher as the 2018 snowmobile is starting to show its age. The 2014 snowmobile was sold for \$3000. That amount, along with the annual \$6000 we set aside each year, gives us \$9000 in our Capital Equipment Fund.
- The racing team has to raise its own funds and is responsible for its own budget; excepting that the club provides a bursary of \$1000 each year and they got \$1000 of our annual government grant which was \$4000 this year. As well, they received donations totalling \$8200; \$4500 from Remsoft and \$1000 each from DW Clark Services, Radical Edge and IJ Burgess Consulting. The remaining \$700 was made by donations from the club members.
- The Club donated \$901 in revenue from the Virtual Loppet to the Fredericton Homeless Shelter.
- The club's physical assets now total \$117,266 at purchase value. \$8,128 worth of assets were added this fiscal year; 18 pairs of roller skis for the Track Attack program and \$1400 for a snowmobile trailer.
- Trails for Life We expect to have an income of \$9960 from the corporate sponsors this year. We have raised \$136,532 to date with an expected \$8,800 in final payments to come from the corporate sponsors next year. There is no PistenBully payment this year as the final payment was made last year. The present unspent balance is \$21,386 and is designated for the ski terrain park and a storage facility, both at Killarney Lake.
- We added \$1000 this year to the Ski Terrain Park fund and now have a total of \$4834. This money will be used for infrastructure improvement.
- The Club supported the Track Attack program in the purchase of 18 pairs of roller skis last fall. Thanks to the membership revenue, a (generous) \$5000 grant from the Government of NB and a \$1000 donation, they have been able to generate positive cash position.






